


Video games (FIFA, 2K) and poker highlighted a casual Thursday night that helped Brothers evaluate attending candidates.

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

Philanthropy Chairman, AJ Getz and Benton Parmley, wanted to come up with a new idea for their very first philanthropic event, one that might never have been done before in our chapter. After several brainstorming committee meetings with the rest of the chapter, we decided on a Casino Night theme.

Turnout is always a concern with these events. So a decision was made to try and hold the event paired with a sorority for increased visibility. With a history of well-known philanthropic causes, AJ and Ben reached out to Alpha Chi Omega first. The sorority raises thousands of dollars each year for domestic violence awareness and sexual assault prevention. After receiving welcome feedback from AXO, joint-planning sessions were immediately scheduled.



The team agreed to hold the event on Friday, February 10th from 6-8:00 p.m. Entry would be \$5 a ticket or \$7 including popcorn and water. A promotional flyer was created and posted immediately on social media to garner awareness.

The event's primary challenge was turning the ATO house basement into an active casino floor. As luck would have it, Brother Ethan Avres (pledge class, year) owned authentic poker and blackjack tables that we could borrow. The ladies from AXO filled the room with numerous casino decorations purchased from Party City.

Tables were set up for the typical casino games – "Texas Hold 'Em" Poker, Blackjack, Craps, Roulette, Dice, and Uno. Popcorn and drinks kept the highrollers refreshed. Jazz music played in the background. Brothers wore white shirts as "dealers" and the ladies of AXO dressed the Vegas part to ensure everyone had a great time.

Within ten minutes from opening, our Casino basement was full of gamblers. Guests received chips to bet in various games – competing for raffle ticket entries to win gift cards.





Touring the new Chop house at Butler U: a marvel of modern technology

The chapter then leased the temporarily-closed Phi Kappa Psi house (which has since returned). The Tau Kapp Epsilon house was demolished to make way for construction of new Chop house.

Construction was scheduled to begin in the spring of 2019, but was delayed due to Covid. Construction was completed in the spring of 2022.

The Butler Lambda Chi Alpha chapter dates back to the 1920s and boasts more than 2,000 alumni (including deceased).

From the initial view of the stately new Lambda Chi Alpha house at Butler University, it appears the Tudor Revival home has been on West Hampton Drive since perhaps, the 1930s. That must be precisely what Rowland Design^{*} had in mind when they conceived plans for the home. But appearances are deceiving. Constructed in 2020-22, this fraternity house is a marvel of modern technology.


Firstly, we have Brother Tom Vriesman (Psi, 1983) to thank for arranging the tour through his friendship with a former Lambda Chi Alpha alumni board member, who put him in touch with Eric Rupenthal. Many thanks to Eric for graciously taking the time to lead the tour and answer our questions.

With 16,000 square feet, the house if relatively small given the size of many Greek homes recently constructed. Yet costs soared to \$6.3 million with a total project cost of \$8 million (\$2 million to pay off an old loan, architectural fees, permits and legal work). The price tag can be mostly attributed to the house's brick and masonry construction (limestone window and entry surrounds) with paned, casement windows; slate roof; and half-timbered, stucco detailing. Interior elements also contributed – the house has state-of-the-art Smart Home technology.

The exceptional, custom Tudor, frame-and-paneled-woodwork foyer staircase has an automatic fire door system that drops from the ceiling to enclose the entire entry into a fire exit. One alumnus donated \$300K to cover the cost of the unique feature.

The building's interior walls are well insulated for temperature efficiency and soundproofing – and the roof spray-foamed to make the attic space a thermal boundary to accommodate the potential expansion of living space.

The well-appointed room featured a large, flat-screen TV, and a white, faux-leather sectional – a very brave choice! The Brothers were especially impressed with the home's exceptional cleanliness.

The house was thoughtfully laid out and we were all amazed with the cleanliness, organization and relative quiet for a building that accommodates 53 brothers and a separate suite for a house mother.

The first floor includes a dining hall, library and a formal/lounge area for reading and studying.

The second and third floors are mainly dorm rooms – mostly doubles with a lounge on each floor equipped with TVs for smaller groups. Bedrooms were adequately spaced for two while providing a bed, desk, chair, and wardrobe for each occupant. Spacious tiled bath and shower rooms were installed on every dorm floor.

The back of the house has an enclosed courtyard with a gas fireplace (piggybacked with a formal room interior fireplace) and comfortable seating for about 25 brothers.

The lock itself connects to the home's Wi-Fi network so that it can be accessed via a smartphone app or a control panel within the home. It connects to a phone via a Bluetooth keyfob. The first floor of the house is dominated by a spacious dining room with rustic chandeliers, slate tile floor, grey hardwood tables and chairs, and two large flat-screen televisions with custom hardwood cabinetry surrounds.

A full-time chef (*wow, what a luxury!*) serves three meals a day from a full commercial-style kitchen with blue subway tiling and stainless steel appliances and countertops. The kitchen also includes a convenient 24-hour beverage and snack center. Large walk-in pantries offer ample storage for organizing meal and dining essentials.

Brothers, can one of you please hit the lottery!

With all the features and furnishings to admire in Lambda Chi Alpha's new home, one wouldn't expect to spend too much time checking out their utility rooms. But architects stuffed this home's utility rooms with state-of-the-art energy-saving devices and conveniences.

The house is wired to the hilt for high-speed internet access. High-efficiency gas heat and Smart Home lighting control systems help save on utility bills. Five, in-line Navian high-efficiency water heaters *(below left)* provide on-demand hot water to meet the high-capacity needs of 55 residents and kitchen.

Space permitting, there's even more technical wizardry we could cover.





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


Why the costly, secretive change? What is the significance of such a structure? Wildly unconventional by 1903 standards, why was this specific design so important?











In 2019's, Living on Campus, An Architectural History of the American Dormitory, author Carla Yanni describes the 1902 Alpha Delta Phi chapter house and Goat House as, "a masculine advertisement for the fraternity's "elitism, secrecy, mystery, and exclusion." The plan - showing the chapter house connected by a long flight of stairs - reveals, Yanni observes, "the fraternity's wish to visually express its masculine virility in a plan resembling an architecturally-modified phallus."


THE ENDURING MYSTIQUE OF CORNELL UNIVERSITY'S


Perched on a hill above Ithaca, N.Y. straddling the Fall River and Cascadilla River gorges, Cornell University's campus is widely (and deservedly) considered one of the nation's most spectacular.

The stunning, natural setting is enhanced by a rich architectural heritage – ten buildings individually listed on the National Register of Historic Places, several local landmarks, and three neighborhoods with Cornell-owned properties listed as National **Register historic districts.**

Instead of appropriating another school's architectural style, Cornell blazed its own eclectic path, incorporating traditional styles – from the Gothics to Willard Straight to Myron Taylor – alongside groundbreaking modern architecture – from the likes of I.M. Pei, Richard Meier, Rem Koolhaas, Earl Glansburgh, and Gyo Obata.

When Alpha Delta Phi fraternity outgrew its' first home, they called on a protégé of Frank Lloyd Wright to design their new house. George R. Dean (1864-1919) of Dean & Dean Architects, Chicago, presented a revolutionary, modern style identified with the "Prairie Style" originated by Louis Sullivan and Frank Lloyd Wright.










ABOVE: The chapter house's 9-sided-round back porch with peak-arched removable windows, timbered ceiling and rocking chairs.

Architect George Dean envisioned a long, linear yellow-brick house in the clean-lined, organic style from the Prairie School of architecture. Also constructed in 1903 was a peculiar edifice separated from the chapter house by 100 feet. Dean's original plan called for a square "mosque-shaped" structure with a large front door entrance connected to the chapter house by a long "flight of steps" (see previous spread top left). What was actually erected was dramatically different. Why?



It was built on a coveted tract of land known as "The Gauntlet" - conspicuously 20 feet higher than the chapter house. Dean called it a Lodge. Ithaca residents and Cornell students initially named it "The Ice House". Brothers named it the "Goat House" - a nineteenth/early-twentieth century term for a meeting room. It would later be lovingly nicknamed "The G" by Brothers.

The domed, star-shaped Goat House has 16 sides. It has no door. It has no windows. It has no visible means of entry or exit of any kind. Access to the Goat House is now a secret underground passageway.

1929: Disaster Strikes

On a brisk winter evening of February 11, 1929, George Dean's 26-year-old Prairie School masterpiece was completely destroyed in a spectacular fire caused by a faulty attic electrical switchbox. The Ithaca fire department offered little help as water pressure to the House produced little more than a stream fit for a garden hose. An Alpha Delt chronicled the tragedy this way:

"Brothers rescued whatever they could hold. Books flew from the library windows, furniture was carried to safety, and the Great Table overturned, piled high with our most sacred documents, then pushed down the icy hill to safety. Praise to those who entered closets and threw out armfuls of suits. In the bitter night, nearly 5,000 spectators – residents, students, and professors – watched helplessly as our chapter house had gone from one of Ithaca's most beautiful buildings, to a smoking heap of rubble"

One hundred feet away, only the Goat House remained standing.

1931: A New Home, A New Beginning

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Devastated by the fire, the tragedy did not deter their Brotherhood. With strong support from alumni, funds were secured for a new house on the same site. The chapter chose none other than one of the most celebrated neoclassical architects of the twentieth century, John Russell Pope (1974-1937), to design their new home. Pope's works include Washington D.C.'s Jefferson Memorial, the National Archives building, and the National Gallery of Art.

The new Alpha Delta Phi lodge was designed in the Jacobethan Revival style in Bedford stone and brick with a crenellated roof parapet, limestone door and window surrounds, slate roof, and a giant leaded-glass bay window that graces a soaring great hall (left). Pope's formal design - worthy of Ivy League traditions and status - fully capitalized on the site's dramatic geographic setting with views of Cayuga Lake. The house is estimated to have taken fifty-five percent of Ithaca's work force to erect.

Remarkably, the house opened in the Fall of 1931 – less than two years after the catastrophic fire. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Place as part of the Cornell Heights Historic District in 1989. The enormous home has been called one of the most distinguished fraternity houses in the country.

As for the Goat House – Alpha Delta Phi historically has refused to disclose any information about the perplexing structure. As you might guess, the infamous building has garnered intense amounts of speculation over the years. The manner in which the building, its purpose and contents are kept in such extreme secrecy obviously provokes the rumor mill. Some believe the structure extends deep underground and ridiculous rumors have purported that it's a geothermal plant that takes heat from convection currents in the earth's mantle. Stories have even surfaced alleging that it's used to summon demons and perform satanic rituals. Both absurd, of course.

One hundred fifteen years after the bizarre doorless/windowless structure was built, an obscure note in the Fraternity's newsletter indicated a rooftop escape hatch was sealed in the early 1940s "in response to an attempted break-in by another fraternity". On the counsel of alumni, the hatch was "returned to service with new security features". More recent news indicated a plan to install digital video recording systems for anti-vandalism purposes.

For the time being, it seems that the Goat House will remain an enigma.
